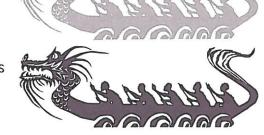

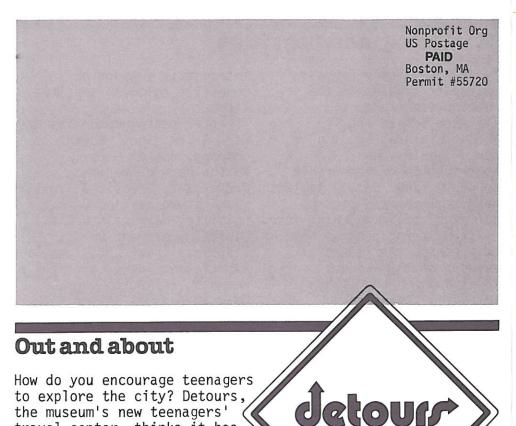

How do you encourage teenagers to explore the city? Detours, the museum's new teenagers' travel center, thinks it has the answer: provide teens with basic information about Boston's transportation system; develop tours based on their interests -- food, sports, music, work, clothing; train teens themselves to staff the travel center; then add a large dollop of splashy graphics to the travel literature.

Twelve tourguides are now in print. Flip them open, and you'll find out where to eat lunch in a building shaped like a helmet (81 Dorchester Avenue in South Boston); where to find a store that stocks half a million baseball cards (Hall's Nostalgia, 21 Mystic Street, Arlington); and where to see a statue of General Patton (Charles River Esplanade).

All of the tourguides are keyed to Detours' own illustrated map of Boston's major transportation systems. Much of the travel information will be available for a nominal charge to walk-in visitors to the Detours office; a transit workshop

and Detours "Passport" will be part of a membership package. The passport will entitle members to discounts on travel, admissions, and special events; museums and attractions will stamp passports with special rubber stamps as a record of the passport holder's trips.

At the travel center, many of the questions will be fielded by "teen agents," teenagers from neighborhood youth centers and clubs who've undergone special training sessions with Detours staff.

Detours begins in mid-July. For more information about membership and the location of the Detours office, call the Detours staff at 426-6500.

Detours is funded in part by a two-year grant of \$117,000 from the Youth Programs Office of the National Endowment for the Humanities.

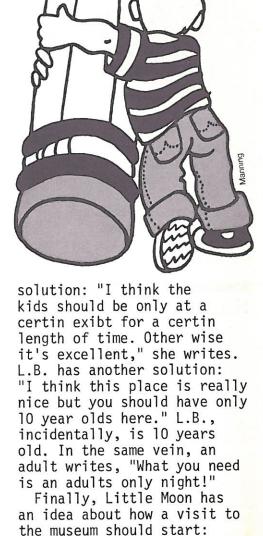
We get lots and lots of notes from our visitors; they're funny, sad, enthusiastic, and heartwarming and we read them all.

The museum's collaborative programs with local colleges and universities continue to flourish. Programs during the 1980 school year included: a seminar for Lesley College students on Museum Education; a science course for early childhood education students at Wheelock College; an outreach program with Harvard's East Asian Studies course taught at the museum

for Boston University; and participation by Lesley College in the Special Needs inservice program.

For the first time this year, four Museum Education students from Wheelock College were placed with museum developers in an experimental, advanced level internship. The interns worked in the Exhibit Center and assisted in the develop-Project; a community education ment of curriculum and public programs.

The Matching program not only boosts the financial support of the museum; it also demonstrates to companies that their employees have a strong

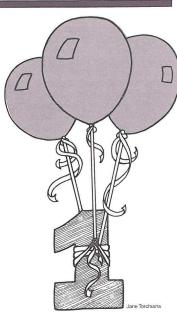
