

"What If You Couldn't...? An Exhibit About Handicaps" returns from travelling across the U. S. and Canada through the Smithsonian Institution Exhibition Services. The exhibit deals with six disabilities. Put on a blindfold and use a cane to find your way through a maze. Learn how to operate a brailler or a telephone device for the hearing impaired. Iry to use a wheel-chair over bricks, gravel and ramps.

Each Wednesday morning during the school year, groups from special education programs visit the Museum with exhibit staff serving as companions and guides. Although the Museum will be open to the public, there are no other school field trip reservations on Nednesday mornings, allowing special needs groups to explore the Museum with less noise and competition.
