POWWOW '92 PARTICIPANTS

AMERICAN INDIAN DANCE THEATRE: More than 15 tribes from the U.S. and Canada perform ceremonial, seasonal, spiritual and social dances in full regalia.

ANCESTRAL SPIRITS: Taino Native American dance performed in honor of the Taino areyto, a performing arts celebration much like a powwow. Dance performed by Sandra Rivera and narrated by Diana Gubiseh-Ayala.

JORGE ARCE & HUMANO BAND: Latino musical styles which retain native instruments including maracas and gourds.

HUEHUETL MUSICAL ENSEMBLE: This group, from the Nahuatl people of Mexico, play authentic pre-columbian music.

INCA SON: The Boston-based group performs traditional songs from the Andes and Latin America, as well as original compositions.

MIXASHAWN: Lee Mixashawn Rozie, a Connecticut Mohegan, presents traditional styles of North and South American music through song, flute and percussion instruments.

TLACOPAN AZTECS: From Mexico, perform traditional Aztec Indian dances in regalia of their own making.

WAMPANOAG NATION SINGERS AND DANCERS: The group represents different bands of the Wampanoag Nation. The songs and dances are traditional Eastern style.


