In the early 1960's, the Museum expanded its activities to include community based programs, curriculum development, educational research, and training programs for teachers and community workers. Experiments on new ways to use exhibits to present information and concepts to children and adults were eagerly accepted by visitors and professionals.

Traditional glass cases were replaced with interactive exhibits in which visitors directly participate: making their own movies, celebrating a Japanese Festival, or using a computer terminal -just to name a few.

In short, the Children's Museum is committed to helping everyone -- especially children -- learn from an increasingly tough and demanding world through direct experiences with real materials. We believe in learning by doing.
