This is a general description of the Museum's 636 programs, plus more specific descriptions of this year's programs, which I've just put together for the 'Cultural Education Collaborative's 1981-82 636 Catalogue. I thought all of you who've taught these programs might be interested in seeing the list of topics we've covered many of which we've repeated several



Museum Wharf 300 Congress Street Boston, MA 02210 (617) 426-6500 Since 1974 the Children's Museum has participated in a program coordinated by the Cultural Education Collaborative, an umbrella organization which links cultural resources and public schools to provide in-depth learning experiences for students. Funded by the State Department of Education, Chapter 636 these programs are designed to strengthen the school curriculum, facilitate integration and make accessible to students, teachers and parents the vast cultural resources unique to the city of Boston.

Many of Boston's major cultural institutions and performing groups provide programs which vary in content from marine life and ballet to American History, Zoology and ancient technology. However, they all provide the students with an opportunity to study over an extended period of time (six weeks to a full semester) at institutions rich in resources and with experts in many fields.

The Children's Museum staff has developed several in-depth programs on topics related to the Museum's collections and areas of interest such as Japanese Culture, Victorian America, Native American Culture, Living Things, Ancient Technology and others. These programs give Museum staff an opportunity to work with students and teachers over a period of time and thus extend their teaching in ways not possible in shorter programs. Teachers become familiar with the extensive resources available at the Museum and borrow materials or sign up for workshops and courses. Best of all students come on their own and with their families to show "their Museum" to others.

Evaluation of the Museum's programs by parents, students, teachers and principals stresses the uniqueness of the Museum's programs in providing students with the opportunity to work with a variety of materials unavailable at school in ways which encourage creativity and learning.

The following chart summarizes the programs offered through the Museum from 1974 to the present.

The Hernandez Cultural Arts Program is designed 1) to familiarize Hernandez teachers, students, and parents with the two Museums as community resources, 2) to strengthen and diversify school curricula with alternative teaching techniques and materials, 3) to foster interracial, multicultural understanding among students through Museum course content and small group work, and 4) to make materials from courses available as bilingual reference materials in the school, with the help of a bilingual parent assistant.

Highlights of two years of collaboration between the Children's Museum and the Hernandez School have been the involvement of the entire school in programs relating to ongoing curricula; a free family night at the Mueum attended attended by over 200 Hernandez students, parents, and teachers: and the incorporation of a wide range of Museum resources, such as kits, exhibits and Recycle materials.

Children's Museum Lewis School Turn of the Century America Grade 7

This twelve week course explores the history and changes in America during the period between 1870 and 1920, with particular emphasis on the history of Boston. To encourage the personal involvement of students in the subject matter, the course includes architectural walks through local neighborhoods, visits to local institutions such as the Black Heritage Trail, use of artifacts from the time period studied, and other resources of the city. Teachers and parents participate in planning and instruction of all activities, such as handling authentic artifacts, role-playing, learning traditional American crafts, and field trips to historic sites. Community specialists play an important role in the active character of the program by relating oral history or demonstrating particular crafts such as quilting and masonry. The program ends with a free family night at the Museum for Lewis parents, teachers and students.

Children's Museum
Donald McKay School
McKay Science Discovery
Grades 4 & 6

The McKay Science Discovery includes three separate programs, each exploring a specific science topic with one class for 6 sessions, with some sessions at the School and some at the Museum. For each course, parents and teachers participate in planning and implementing the ways in which Museum resources and activities are used to supplement the school's science curriculum.

The <u>City Birds</u> program helps 4th graders develop an increased awareness of the natural environment of the city through a series of activities relating to birds. Students observe and identify birds in the outdoor environment of the

School and Museum, dissect a chicken and talk about bird behavior and anatomy, and scientific processes in general.

Science Potpourri is also a 4th grade program which explores the urban environment, but the focus of this course's activities is divided among the animal life and geology of the city. Students gather and identify plants, observe birds, and explore geology in terms of the variety of stone formations and surfaces in urban structures. Paper-making and cooking activities illustrate the uses of plants, and students may try their hands at geology-related activities such as brick-making.

Ancient Chemistry is a 6th grade program in which students learn how the processes of extraction and fermentation have been used from ancient times to the present in the preparation of dyes, pigments, cosmetics, ore and wines. They explore the ways in which these processes are used in common household products and try the techniques themselves by squeezing or cooking a variety of natural materials to make dyes, scents and oils.

Activity materials from all components of the program are documented as a permanent reference for the school, and all McKay parents, teachers and students are invited for a free family night at the Museum.
