Museum Wharf 300 Congress Street Boston, MA 02210 (617) 426-6500 THE MOCCASIN GAME

This is a quessing game played by many American Indian nations.

Objective

The object of the game is to guess under which moccasin the "special" object is hidden. The person who has the most sticks at the end of the game wins.

Materials

4 small objects, 3 alike and 1 very different; (nuts, pebbles, coins)

10 counting sticks or lima beans 1 blanket

4 moccasins

2 players

1 pointer

How to Play

Line moccasins up, face down, toes pointing in the same direction.

Place counting sticks in a pile, to the side of the moccasins.

Players sit facing each other, with the moccasins in between them.

Decide who will guess first and who will hide the objects first.

The person who is going to guess holds the blanket up in front of the moccasins while the other player hides one object under each moccasin.

Using the pointer, the guesser touches the moccasin where he thinks the "special" object is hidden.

If he guesses correctly on the first try, he gets four sticks and it is his turn to hide the objects. If not, he tries again.

If he guesses correctly on the second try, he gets three sticks and it is his turn to hide the objects. If not, he tries again.

If he guesses correctly on the third try, he gets only two sticks and it is his turn to hide the objects. If, after three trys, he still has not guessed where the special object is hidden, the person who hid the objects gets four sticks and hides the objects all over again.

The game continues until one person has won all the sticks or until there are no more sticks.

Rebuilding an Old Japanese House.

A "Kyo-machiya" (traditional row house) from the silk weaving neighborhood of Kyoto was packed in 43 crates and shipped to Boston with 5 Kyoto carpenters to reassemble the 150-year-old house inside Boston's Children's Museum.

This one hour color film shares first-hand observation of traditional Japanese tools and wood construction techniques, and records three Shinto housebuilding ceremonies. Gold Prize winner in the 25th International Competition for Films on Japan, 1981.
