



DETOURS goes show-biz this month - bringing you some great suggestions about places where you can learn to sing, dance, act or play music. Whether you're in it for the fame or the fun, you can find a program to help you express yourself. Here four talented teens describe the special programs they have found.



At fifteen, Gina Fernandes is the youngest cast member of the Boston Youth Theater's production of I Am Boston, a comic musical about some unsung heroes in Boston's history, but she almost didn't show up for the auditions. "I didn't want to do it, but some special people encouraged me. I was really nervous. I've sung in a chorus and I sing to myself around the house, but this was the first time I ever sang alone in front of a group of people.

"I have some American Indian in me and Portuguese and Cape Verdean. I'm proud of what I am, so I decided to sing a song called Portuguese Love. I was so nervous that I started singing too fast and I stopped in the middle. People started clapping and cheering, but I said, 'Let me finish the song.' I surprised myself and it was a nice experience."

Now Gina, who is in the 10th grade at Madison Park High, rehearses at least 3 hours a day with the other cast members and says, "We're ...like a family."

Being part of a group performing toimportant to Adam Goodman, too. That's one reason why he enrolled in the certificate program of the Improvisation Studies Department at the New England Conservatory

Adam, who is sixteen and also enjoys the teamwork of hockey and soccer, has been playing the piano for 9 years. He started out with classical music, but now he likes to play jazz - especially songs by Duke Ellington, Thelonious Monk and Earth, Wind and Fire. "When I listen to music," says Adam, "I'm impartial. A lot of my friends will only listen to disco or rock, but I'm pretty open to all types of music. If I like it."

Adam takes private piano lessons and studies music theory at the Conservatory, but his favorite class is his ensemble group where he can get together with about ten other kids, form a small band and play music - mainly jazz. "The whole program is about not just playing your instrument, but understanding the music that you are playing and using that understanding when you are playing with a group."



I paint barrettes and headbands for kids at my school. I get my art supplies, like acrylic paint and tiny brushes, at Lee Wards in Burlington. It takes me about 15 minutes to do a pair and I charge \$1.00 a pair for barrettes and \$1.25 for headbands, but sometimes I give them away as presents. I got started when I saw some kids doing it at school and charging a lot of money, so I decided to try it and charge less. It's really fun because you can use your imagination.



Arthur Sheridan Jr. age 12, East Cambridge, Harrington School

"I have a paper stand for the Herald American at the Dept. of Public Works in Cambridge. I have an apron and a change maker and I sell the papers to the people on their way to work. I have to get up at 5:30 in the morning and I work from 6:30 to 7:15. I make 10¢ off every paper that I sell and \$2.00 a day just for being there, so I get about \$15.00 a week Some people see me there every day so they give me tips. I save half of my money in the bank and I keep half of it to spend so it works out ok.



Ware: age 14, Roxbury, Mario Umana

"I babysit in my building on weekends and some weeknights I watch two boys - one is 9 and the baby is 2 about 6 to 1 o'clock for about \$6.00 a night. I like it when we all get along and we do things together, but if they get out of hand, I just tell them to go to bed or I'll call their mother. I do my homework and eat upstairs so that when I go downstairs I'll just have the two of them to look out

"In the winter I go downtown to some office buildings and shovel snow. The guys that are in charge of different offices pay me some money for shovelling out walkways so their clients can get in. I've also done private homes. I charge by the job. If they want me to shovel one corner to another corner I charge about \$5 to \$6. For steps - I get a broom and sweep them down and put salt on them for about 2 bucks. In the fall, if I see a yard with a lot of leaves, I go and ask the people if they want it raked. I'll charge \$1 to put the leaves in a basket and take them to a dumpsite."

"I'm a counselor in a day care center that a nurse from school has started in her house. When I get home from school I go there from about 2:30 to 6 or 7 maybe two days a week. I play lots of games with the kids, teach them words, sing songs and feed them and clean up after them. There's an hour where you read books and a play dough hour that the kids love. I mostly watch 2 and 3 year olds and I get around \$12.00 an afternoon. It's good experience because I want to be a pediatrician."



it's a perfect day for ice skating, the one winter sport that's even better indoors. DETOURS has discovered the most fun a quarter can buy - hours of sliding and gliding with your friends at an MDC rink.

All the rinks have roofs and many are enclosed, but you should still bundle up against the chill (and spills!) Some of the most popular places are listed here, but you might want to check the blue pages of the phone book for the rink nearest you.

The Steriti Rink in Boston's North End features a food concession with pizza, of course, and a terrific view of the harbor including the Constitution and Bunker Hill Monument. For music to skate by, kids and adults request FM radio stations like KISS 108 and WJIB. Skate rentals are available. (MBTA Orange or Green Line: North Station. Rink is on Commercial St. two blocks Call 523 9327 for skating hours.)



Take time out while your skates are sharpened to sip hot chocolate in the warming room of the Neponset-Devine Memorial Rink in Dorchester and watch your friends still out on the ice. This rink has a tape deck and record player as well as a radio, so you can bring in your own skating music, (MBTA Red Line: Fields Corner, transfer to Bus 20 to Neponset Circle. Walk five minutes along Morrissey Blvd. to Garvey Play-ground. Call 436-4356 for skating hours.)









It's smooth skating all the way at the Reilly Rink in Brighton. Once every hour the Zamboni machine makes its rounds removing every rut and wrinkle from the 200' by 87' skating surface. Weekends are especially popular, but you'll have to bring your own skates. There's no food available here, just lots of superior ice. (MBTA Green Line C to end of line or Green Line D to Reservoir. Rink is at Beacon St. and Chestnut Hill Ave. Call 277-7822 for skating hours.)

Sunday afternoons the 990 Emmons-Horrigan Rink in Charlestown is crowded with kids you have finished their homework (maybe) and know a bargain when they see one (definitely). Like all MDC rinks, skating here costs only 25¢ for kids under 18. Bring your skates and join them. (MBTA Orange Line: Community College. Walk toward Bunker Hill Mall on Rutherford Ave. Call 242-9728 for skating hours.) (cont. on back page)



Chris Green: age 12, Roxbury, Phyllis Wheatley School







the temperature and cleanliness of the water, charting feeding schedules and monitoring the air bubble and wave-making machines that help recreate the natural environment the animals left behind in the wild.

We learned that many of the people who take care of the animals at the Aquarium started out keeping fish as a hobby. Later they may have gotten more experience by working in a pet store. Marine biologists on the staff conduct experiments (like the one we saw on the genetics of "left-handed' and "right-handed" flounder) and do the research that keeps the giant lobster and the shark pups healthy and happy
