A comprehensive program of demonstrations, talks, and activities for parents of preschoolers will take place throughout April.

Toddlers Take Over will tackle issues such as child development, parent networks and resources, relationship among siblings, travelling with toddlers, and parents who are working or returning to work.

Organized by Jeri Robinson, the museum's early childhood developer, the program will present Robie Harris, author of Before You Were Three and Don't Forget to Come Back, who will be talking about developmental issues; Linda Eubanks, presenting stories and songs for ages 4 and under: Judy O'Hare with a preschool puppet show; and Nancy Lineback demonstrating Play, Watch, and Talk.

There'll also be a demonstration of Kindergym; a showing of a film, "New Relations: Fathers and Sons"; a presentation of the Suzuki method of teaching very young children to play music by ear; and a Tot Stuff workshop on April 9 and 12 (see Workshops section for details).

Activities will take place on Sundays and Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday mornings. A complete schedule of Toddlers Take Over events will be available at the museum and listed on the What's Up Line. Activities will be on a first come, first served basis.

# Great Pets Day

Gerbils, puppies, kittens, and rabbits all make great household pets and kids will learn all about how to choose them and how to care for them on Great Pets Day, Saturday, April 11.

Experts from the Massachusetts Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (MSPCA) will be on hand to show children



how to take care of puppies and kittens, and staff from the Massachusetts Herpetological Society will be showing and talking about snakes.

Although children are often tempted to adopt an animal from the wild as a pet -- animals such as

opposums, woodchucks, and owls -- it's not a wise idea and staff from the Blue Hills Trailside Museum will explain why. There's an interesting alternative, though, and museum staff will be telling kids about shelf pets -- animals that can be kept for a night, then released in the morning.

Pet lovers can also acquire tips on animal observation, learn how to make bug houses, and take pony rides.

There'll be lots of animals throughout the museum on Great Pets Day, so kids are asked to leave their own pets at home.

workshop.



## Kids go places with Detours

Detours Is For Kids Who Are Going Places, says the bright red and yellow poster that's springing up on bulletin boards all over Boston, and that's exactly the role of the new museum-affiliated organization which opens the doors of its mobile head-quarters, a 1954 city bus, on April 18.



Detours encourages teenagers from the Greater Boston area to explore the city by providing them with illustrated tour guides, a workshop on Boston's transit system, a quarterly newsletter, a passport packed with free or discounted admissions to the city's museums and attractions, and trip planning advice.

Individual memberships are \$5 with reduced rates for youth and community groups. Since Detours is on wheels itself, groups who join will have the option of arranging for workshops to be held at their sites.

To get the program off to a fast start, Detours' first newsletter, distributed to 125 schools and community centers in March, featured an entry blank for a membership drawing, and the 500 winners will receive a free membership and an invitation to a special opening week workshop.


Each of the 10 tour guides explores a theme that has been carefully selected to appeal to teenagers -sports, food, art, fashion, music, and work, Painstakingly researched by the Detours' staff, the guides accentuate the unusual -a self-guided tour of the Esplanade on roller skates dubbed "Rolling On the River" and a coffee shop in Gloucester where you can rub shoulders with fishermen at the end of the day. The guides are accompanied by Detours' own illustrated map of Boston's major transportation systems.

The 1954 city bus, last in commercial service in Haverhill, is now refurbished inside and out and sports a gleaming new paint job. It was donated to Detours by Michaud Bus Lines of Salem, a major motor coach tour operator. The gift even included driving lessons for Sue Porter, Detours' program manager, "She's having a little trouble with corners. but she's learning quickly. was "Spike" Michaud's assessment of his driving student's ability.

Detours is funded in part by a Youth Project grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Membership is open to anyone ages 11-16. For applications, contact the Detours Office at the museum.
