\$5m drive begins

The museum officially kicked off its Phase II capital compaign on March 30 at the unveiling of the new lobby exhibit, which is dedicated to those who've played a role in the museum's history and the move to Museum Wharf.

The \$5 million drive is designed to complete the building and programs begun under Phase I and to build the community outreach endowment as part of a \$500,000 matching challenge grant from the Permanent Charity Fund of Boston.

Dear Members and Friends,

As you probably know, all of the federal programs that have provided funds for the Children's Museum are in jeopardy: the Institute for Museum Services, the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the National Science Foundation's Public Understanding of Science Program.

We need your help now. As users of the museum's services and programs, your support will make a difference. I urge you to sit down today and make a phone call or write a letter or Mailgram to your Senator and Representative. Even Congressman who have publicly opposed the cuts need constituent support.

Here's some background information:

-- All four programs meet real needs, are professionally administered, and are moderate in cost. They are designed to complement and stimulate, not replace, earned income and private contributions.

-- Over the last 20 years, the museum has received \$2.8 million in federal funds. This has stimulated \$4.9 million in private contributions and \$4.8 million in new earned income -- a match of more than 3 to 1.

-- Without this seed money, our forward momentum is jeopardized. Programs will be lost, and private funds which now underwrite free or low cost services will be diverted to general operating support. Twenty years of hard work toward financial self sufficiency and public service could be derailed.

-- In summary, we're seeking a moderate and even-handed retrenchment in all federal agencies -- not the wholesale dismantling of effective and popular programs.

While all these signs of spring and summer have been blossoming, we've been busy planning our summer events as you can see from the


A Chinese festival presents games, demonstrations, and

High in the sky In addition to the magnificent view of the city. summer visitors to the John Hancock Observatory will be treated to the work of three Japanese artists from Boston and children's art from Kvoto, Boston's Sister City. The exhibit, organized by museum staff member Marcia Iwasaki, includes a bronze sculpture by Ikuko Burns, a metal sculpture by Michio Ihara, and ceramics by Makoto Yabe. The exhibit runs from June 9 to September 7. The observatory is at 200 Clarendon Street and is open Mon-Sat, 9am-11pm; Saturday 10am-11pm.



Celebrity bottle The Hood milk bottle is back in the news again -- this time in the April issue of Smithsonian. A full page photo of the bottle appears in an article on Chester Liebs, director of the Historic Preservation Program at the University of Vermont. Liebs is quoted as saying the preservation of the 1930's Taunton landmark was "probably one of the most significant preservation efforts affecting a 20thcentury historic roadside building."
